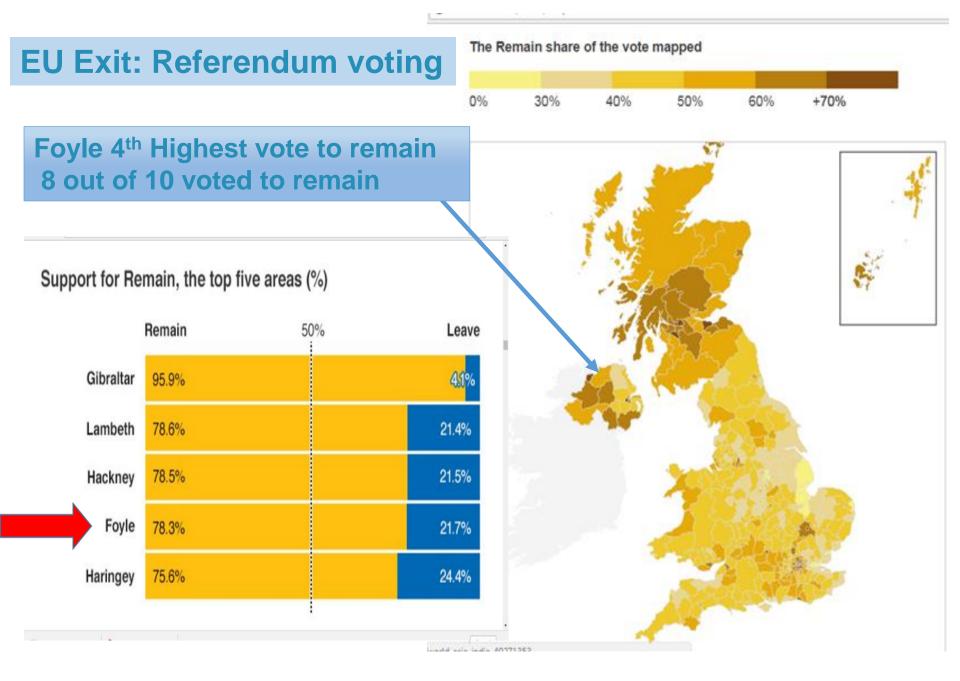

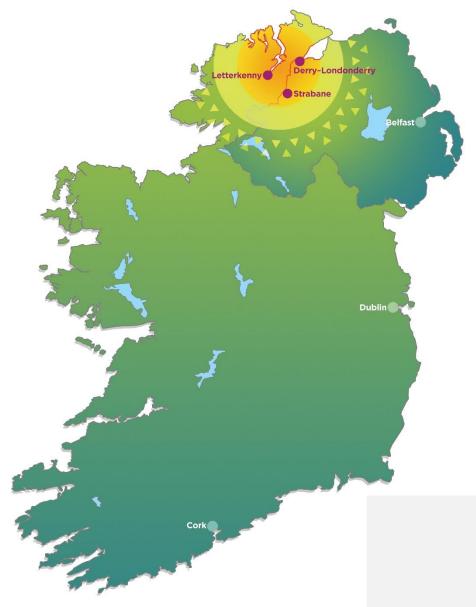

- 35% of population <25 years

|------------|-----------------|------------------------------|-----------------|-----------------|
| GDP Impact | -2.8% | -4.3% | -4.3% | -7.0% |
| Exports | -3.3% | -4.4% | -4.5% | -7.7% |
| Imports | -3.5% | -4.7% | -4.8% | -8.2% |

Note: The impact on GDP under a Customs Union scenario could be reduced to 3.4% if political agreement can be reached to minimise customs procedures.

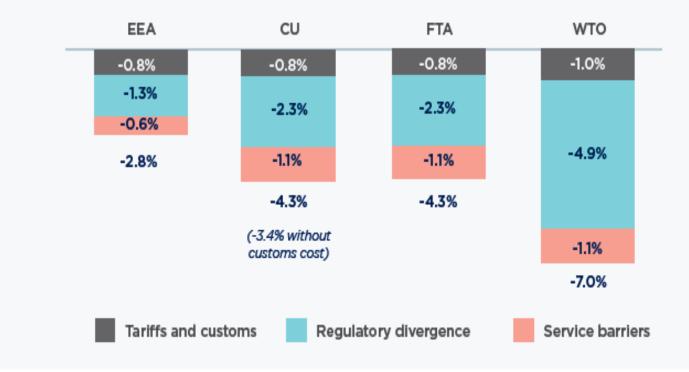

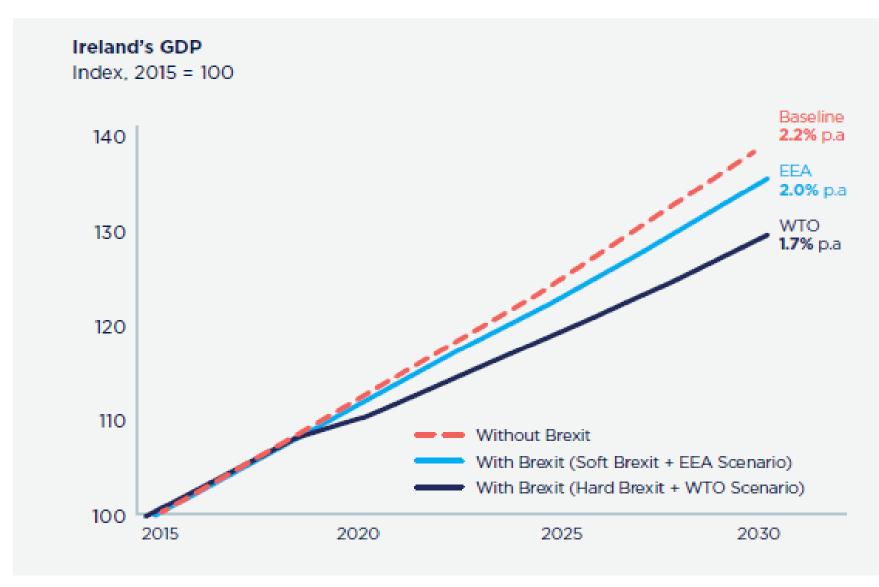

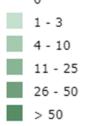


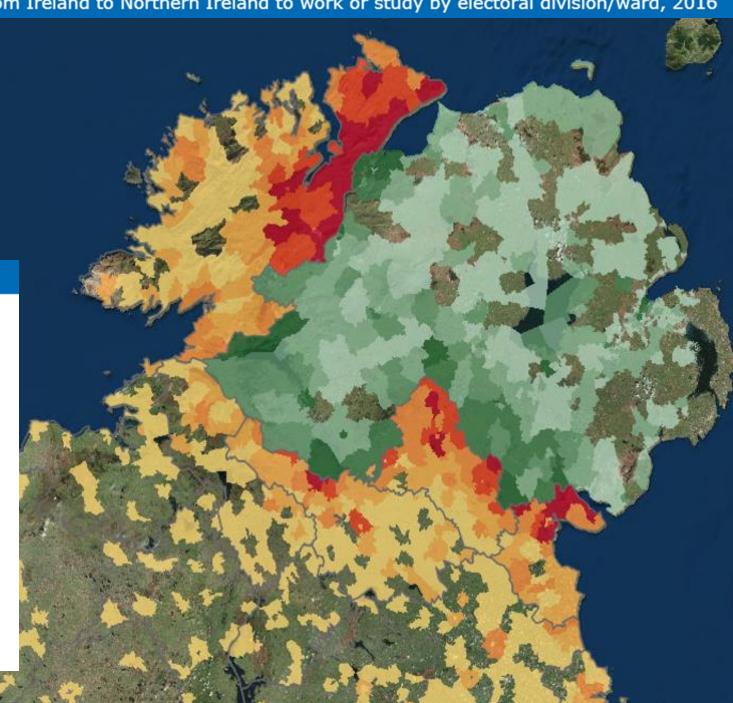
Persons commuting from Ireland to Northern Ireland to work or study by electoral division/ward, 2016

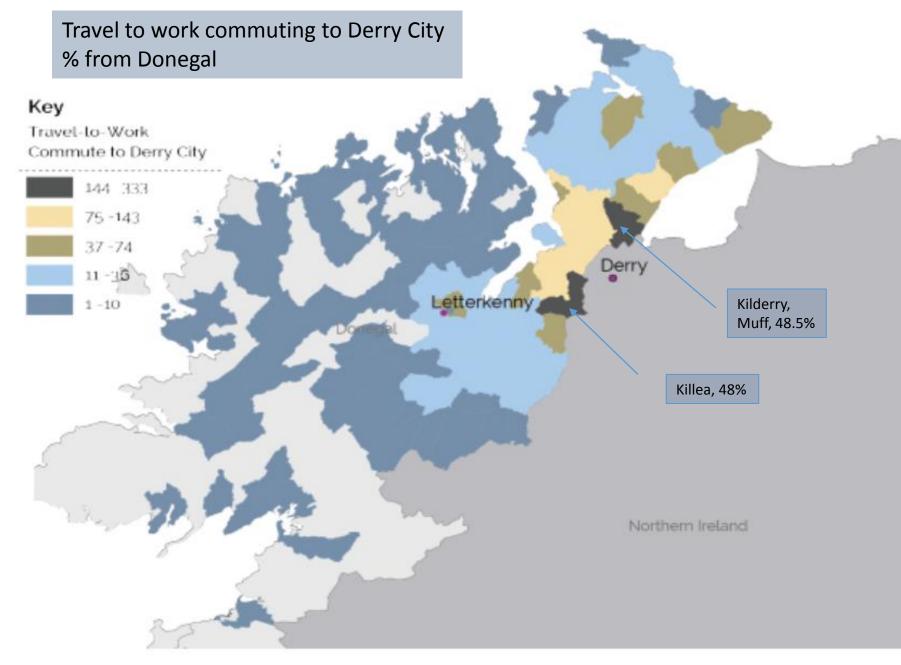

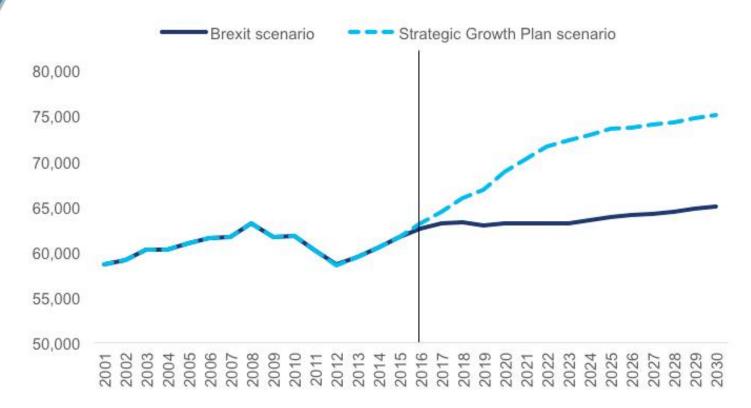

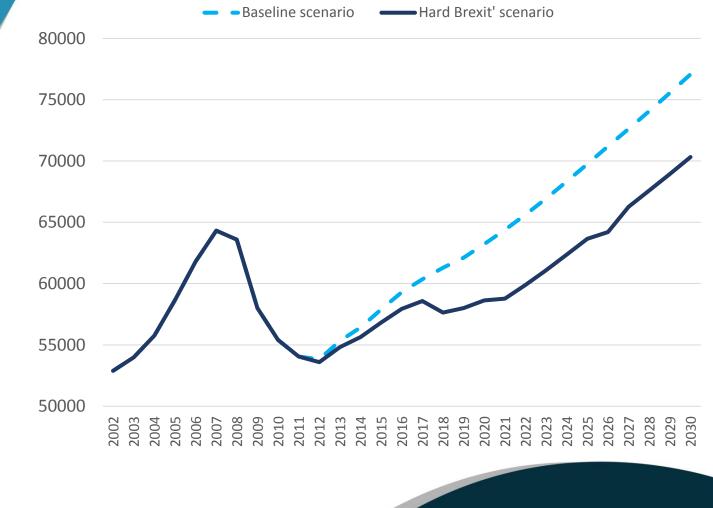


Derry and Strabane Brexit and Strategic Growth Employment Forecast

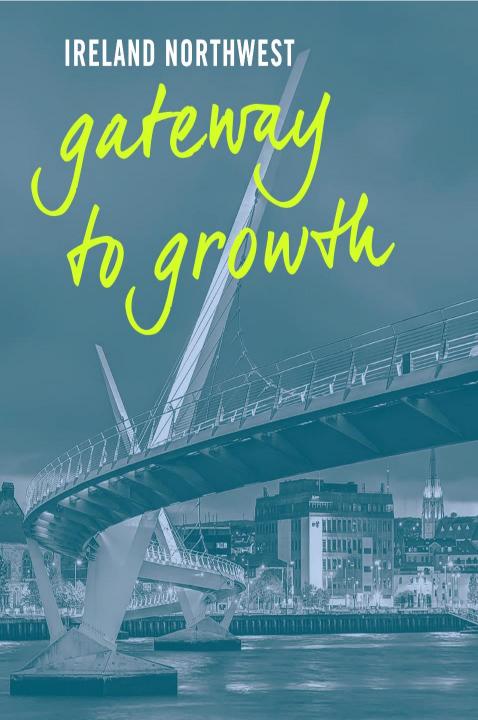

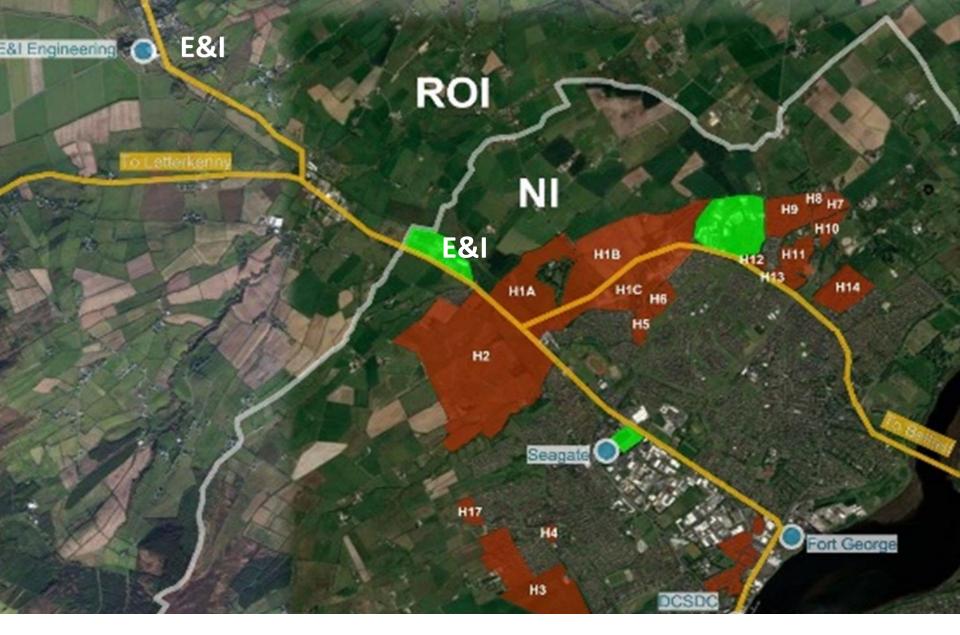
Living and working in a Border Region: the people – the knowns and unknowns

Living and working in a Border Region: the place - the knowns and unknowns

- Impact non-uniform spatially and sectorally
- Disruptive effect NI productivity
- Some industries will see little impact I.T.
- Some will face major challenges Agri-food – Pharma – Chemicals – Electrical Machinery – Wholesale/Retail

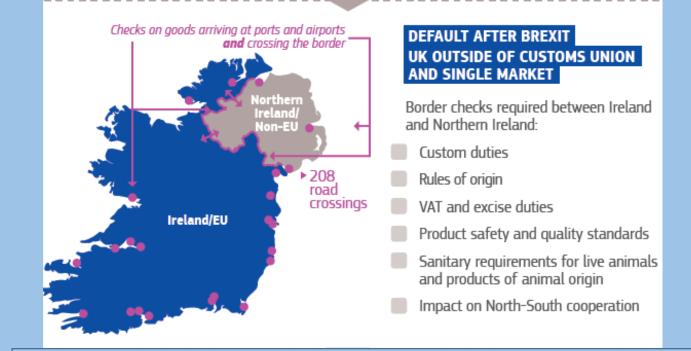

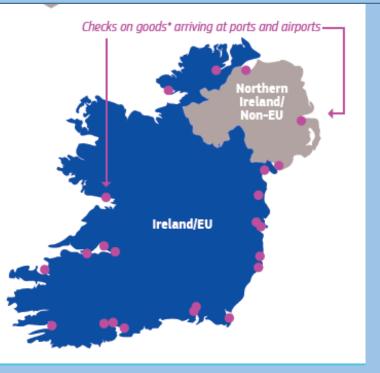

However, Donegal/Derry disproportionately affected ...

Heavy dependency on 'traditional industry', farming, agri-food/ fishing

The areas affected most are least likely to benefit from the relocation of UK financial services without state intervention

Dual Economy- sectoral composition - FDI/Indigenous

Firm Characteristics

Indigenous– low value added, low export propensity/diversity, heavily dependent on NI/GB market

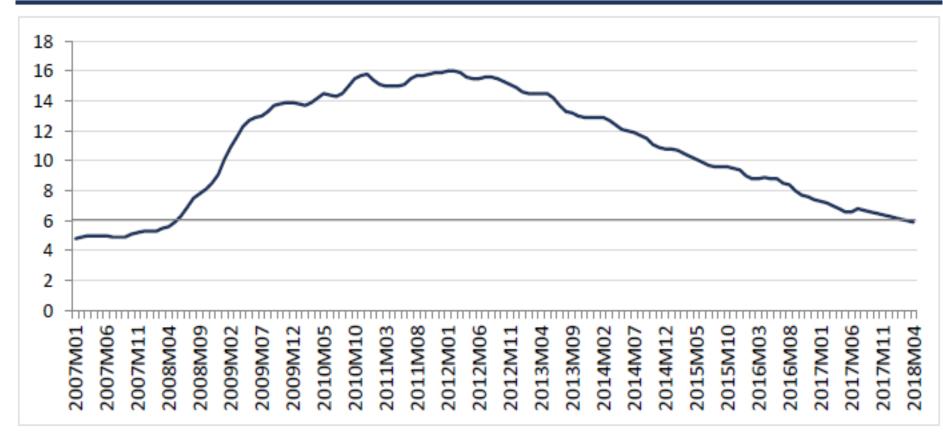
FDI – High tech – more capacity to adapt to change less dependent on UK market
