3. Update from PEACE Team (Sue)

3.1 Update from SEUPB

Input from Ciarán Hanna (online), introducing his role and any current points of interest.

KPMG are top of the Auditor/Controller call off list – the process is underway to appoint them.

'Changemakers Funds' (Small Grants under measures 1.2 and 6.2) held two community information sessions in the DCSDC area in March. Funding will open around end of April. Groups can register directly with Co-operation Ireland for support and updates.

TEO have asked for a list of dates of PEACEPLUS events April – June for potential ministerial visits.

3.2 General update on PEACE Team work

HR/Recruitment: Clare Wilson has been appointed as the new Finance Officer and will begin on 1st May. Connor Crawford has been formally appointed in a temporary contract to end June as clerical/administrative support until end June 25 to cover this transition period.

PEACEPLUS Procurement: The 2 final tenders, Ballyarnett Early Years and Ballyarnett Women's Programme, are appointable and will be ratified at April Committee. Procurement are reporting some difficulties with the new UK tenders legislation since 24th February preventing/complicating links to the OJEU and the RoI E-tenders service – we have asked SEUPB to advise. DCSDC need a solution for this for the 2 SLA projects which still need to do capital procurements.

April and May: Focus is on completing sign off of any remaining pre-contract checks and contracts. Most of this, barring the final two, will be complete pre-Easter. Team are also following through on appointment of Controller Function – KPMG are in discussions with SEUPB at present. PEACE Team will have a spring focus on 'onboarding' the newest projects successfully – one more mandatory training session scheduled for Thursday 29th May (Strabane) and one bespoke IT support/Evaluation and Monitoring Focused Workshop (w/c 19th May). Many projects are not yet uploading their cross-community % splits or their reporting tab of anonymised participants – further messaging to projects is required on this to be able to monitor the programme effectively. Probably some kind of a projects networking meeting in June. We are also learning JEMS and compiling the first claim.

5. CRT (Comm Regen & Transformation)/ Management / Comms Update

5.1 Steering Group Update (Chair: Gerard Deane)

Group met Tuesday 11th March in Holywell. Steering group noted the recruitment updates. Significant conversation had around IT support/Evaluation and Monitoring – agreement that the team should organise a bespoke optional training session on this for projects which require support. Group discussed the KPMG audit/controller function extensively and noted some concerns about potential cost impact depending on what figure comes back. The steering group sought (and received) reassurances that projects already contracted will not be impacted. If the

cost provided is not within allocated budgets, then the flat rate overheads would take the first financial hit (within reason).

The potential content approach to next Magazine was discussed and agreed that distribution (hard copy) would be around community and public venues. Group also discussed pros and cons to taking Board Meetings out to different venues ie. Funded project locations, so that Board could see CRT and other projects on site. The downside will be the potential lack of connectivity for hybrid meetings, but the positives will be increased Board engagement and understanding of funded projects. It was agreed that moving board meetings overall would be positive.

Recommendation: Board Meetings (and potentially steering group meetings) should be held in a range of venues where PEACEPLUS has funded projects.

5.2 Team and Traffic Lights Update (Mary Claire/Fiona)

6. TPC (Thriving Peaceful Communities Theme) Update

6.1 Steering Group Update (Chair: Alison Wallace)

Group met Wednesday 5th March in the Shared Future Centre. It was noted by members that there was limited attendance at this steering group. The Steering group looked in depth at the monitoring and evaluation systems which projects have to complete so as to gain a fuller understanding of the systems and potential training/support needs.

They also discussed the layout of the traffic lights to gain full understanding of what the information contained in them is showing. They took in an overview of the TPC theme projects – discussing how each individual project is progressing and were content with the progress to date on all projects. They encouraged the PEACE Team to try to raise awareness amongst some projects of the usefulness of linking with Local Growth Partnerships as some projects are more aware of those structures than others. They were supportive of Board and potentially steering group meetings rotating around a range of venues.

Recommendation: To encourage attendance at future steering group meetings.

7. CCD (Celebrating Cultural Diversity Theme)

As with other steering groups, there was discussion to understand the auditing/control function process just being begun and the evaluation and monitoring systems in place. Group were keen to understand what happens if the auditing/control cost comes in over budget. They also noted the positive media coverage from projects attached to the steering group papers. Now that we've moved from the procurement to delivery phase, the steering group noted the level of detail and additional information that is now available in the traffic lights. The steering group also discussed a helpful meeting that had been held the night previously on the WNP BAME 'Out and About' project – with collaboration between WNP, Fuse Arts and the PEACE Team to assist with connections to the BAME voluntary sector and project delivery.

1 Meeting Opening

1.1 Welcome and Apologies

Apologies received from Aisling Hutton, Fiona Lafferty, Ciarán Hanna

Ciarán Hanna (SEUPB) was scheduled to attend but sends his apologies due to the half-term break. He will be present at the next meeting.

1.2 Conflict of Interest –

Members are reminded to declare any specific conflicts of interest as and when any issues arise in the agenda which are over and above what is already held on the written declarations.

None were declared.

1.3 Minutes of Previous meeting/Matters arising - Board meeting of December 2024 were held to be an accurate record.

1.4 Chair / Co-Chair Positions

The positions of chair and co-chair were discussed. Routinely these posts are for 1 year but both Catherine and Martin have been in post since September 2023. After discussion the Board unanimously agreed to keep them in the roles until the first board meeting in Autumn 2025..

Proposed: Gus Hastings

Seconded: Claire Russell

2. Guest Presentation

Francine Moran – NWRC ‘Inspire, Enthuse, Equip’ project (TPC theme) and ‘Green Clubs’ project (CRT theme). The presentation focused more on Inspire, Enthuse, Equip as Green Clubs is just starting. Francine delivered a powerpoint presentation detailing where both projects are currently at. She noted that there are significant opportunities for the local community and voluntary sector to receive free, accredited training in community development (and related areas like facilitation, volunteering etc). Board members may wish to pass information on to their constituencies. She explained that the ‘Green Clubs’ concept has its origins in the GAA Green Clubs initiative and has a framework a bit like mentoring to help sports clubs bring sustainability into the mainstream of their operations. The PEACEPLUS project is open to 10 sports clubs of any sports.

- Aidan asked if there were plans to deliver courses in Strabane, Francine made it clear they were hoping to do so. Sue suggested that Strabane area groups could collaborate and seek a course which, provided there was also cross-community engagement, would most meet the needs of a range of groups in that area.
- Dominic asked about the possibility of having Level 3 youth work included. He noted the big gap between level 2 and 3 in this and how vital upskilling participants to Level 3 was. Francine stated that level 2 was what was realistic within their budgets. Sue made a point that the NWRC tender actually went above and beyond, with most content aiming for OCN Level 2s instead of Level 1s, which would have been the cheaper and easier option.
- Claire asked about the geographical spread of delivery – did it include rural areas? Francine confirmed it was a council wide initiative. Sue reiterated that Board members could be active in their constituencies/areas encouraging groups to collaborate, especially cross-community collaboration, to request particular training opportunities for their area. Local Growth partnership representatives on the board could be crucial in this.
- Sue mentioned the importance for other projects to promote Inspire Enthuse Equip due to the struggling employment rates of the youth in this sector; the more participants, the more youth would be working in the sector.

- Declan questioned the criteria and age needed to attend the course, Francine stated there was no prior experience of working within these OCN fields needed.
- Gus clarified if the awarding body is OCN. Yes.
- Sharon asked when the community development course starts – March/April. The level 3 longer course will be September. (The Board noted SCRA are doing a Community development course at the minute).

The Board seemed eager for the project to have some great impacts and highly praised Francine's presentation and efforts to date on delivery. Francine left the meeting afterwards.

3. Update from PEACE Team (Sue)

3.1 Update on SEUPB

Our Case Officer, Ciarán Hanna will join us online at our next meeting as he was unable to attend. He sent a written update on Auditing/First Control (no formal update from SEUPB as yet), JEMS claims (financial claims can be submitted but cannot be paid until auditing is in place. Guidance will be available soon), and CPD progress with two CRT SLA projects. SLA capital projects have been delayed due to issues with CPD forms and a lack of direct communication. Mary-Claire is helping to resolve this. There was discussion about SEUPB attendance at future meetings.

Gus said how it was good to keep SEUPB in the loop. Martin agreed and restated the space for freedom of speech in the board. Members agreed to invite Ciarán Hanna to alternate Board meetings.

Action: Team to invite SEUPB Case Officer to alternative Board Meetings.

3.2 General update on PEACE Team work

Sue provided the following update from the team

HR/Recruitment: Since the end of January, Gemma Scarlett has transitioned to a new role with the NHS in Birmingham. Her departure represents a significant loss to the team, particularly in terms of financial operations and the coordination of evaluation and monitoring activities. The position was initially advertised internally, but no candidate was selected. It is now being opened up externally, with the application deadline set for Monday, February 24th at 4 p.m. Additionally, recruitment for temporary clerical and administrative support, lasting until June 2025, is currently underway.

PEACEPLUS Procurement: Two outstanding tenders, issued for the third time, remain in progress. These are for the Ballyarnett Early Years and Ballyarnett Women's Programme projects, both due to close on March 7th. If suitable candidates are found, the decisions will be confirmed at the April Committee. However, if the tenders are not appointable, they may be affected by new UK legislation, with the full implications and timelines yet to be clarified. PEACE Managers Meeting: On January 28th, the PEACE team hosted an informal session for the NI & RoI Council's PEACE Managers Forum. This meeting also coincided with other managers observing our project training, providing an excellent opportunity for networking.

Gus questioned if the team are able to help out the projects with the tender process. Sue confirmed that the team is not allowed legally as it would be a conflict of interest.

Members discussed how strict the tender marking process is. If a project fails on one stage they fail the tender.

Dominic Bonner gave apologies and left the meeting for another engagement.

February and March: The primary focus has been on finalizing pre-contract checks and completing the remaining e-tender processes, with the aim of ensuring the programme is nearly fully contracted by the end of the financial year, before Easter. Pending SEUPB approval, the goal is to start reporting and submitting claims on JEMS and to appoint a Controller. Efforts are also underway to promote the Changemakers small grants initiative.

4. Confidential update on Tender Assessments.

Sue gave the Board updates on the Tender Assessments

4.1 Tenders Update: Non-confidential (processes fully completed since last Board Meeting)

Sue noted that the team, so far, have run 82 tender exercises to get 58 projects over the line. That's an average of 1.42 tender ads/processes per contract awarded. The Board noted the high volume of work involved in this and expressed appreciation for the team.

5.0 CRT (Comm Regen & Transformation) Management / Comms Update

5.2 CRT workplan update (PEACE Team)

Management Workplan: The HR/Recruitment update has been provided. The Board will observe that the traffic light system has been revamped as we transition into the delivery phase. Regarding evaluation and monitoring, all active projects now have access to their SharePoint folders and Excel tracking sheets. While most of the process has been progressing smoothly, some teams and projects are still addressing certain issues. By now, all contracted projects were expected to have submitted bi-monthly reports to familiarize themselves with the system. The next round of bi-monthly reports is set for submission at the end of February, with groups required to include the reporting tab of the Excel monitoring sheet for the first time. The PEACE Team is currently familiarizing themselves with the back-end systems to gather data for the Board and programme management.

Communications Workplan: The mandatory training for groups took place on Tuesday, 28th January. A follow-up session is scheduled for 25th February. SEUPB has updated their logo, which will impact us as the lead partner and affect our projects moving forward. Additional e-zines were released in December and January. We will hold off on the next magazine release until all projects have been contracted. We are also in the process of ordering more branded merchandise—likely pens, seed sticks, and mints. Please refer to the press coverage in the Appendix for more details.

CRT Workplan: Members were made aware to refer to the traffic lights for the latest updates on CRT Workplan implementation. Mary Claire has already provided the Board with details on the specific projects and the new traffic light layout. The Board was given the opportunity to ask questions. A reminder of the Policy on Support to Groups is included for reference.

Waterside Neighbourhood Partnership have launched the Out and About project. This is a project supported by PEACEPLUS, a programme managed by the Special EU Programme Body (SEUPB) funded under the theme of Celebrating Cultural Diversity, and is funded through Derry City and Strabane District Council's PEACEPLUS Local Co-Designed Action Plan.

The aim of the Celebrating Cultural Diversity theme is to recognise the existence of a variety of cultural or ethnic groups within our communities and to increase the understanding of and respect for all cultural identities.

Strand 2 will bring together representatives of the BAME sector and the wider CNL/PUL communities to develop and deliver a programme of activities that recognises the existence of a variety of cultural and ethnic groups within our communities.

The programme of activities will allow residents from diverse backgrounds to connect and help them understand and enjoy culture, history heritage both within and outside our City and District and to have fun and build lasting relationships leading to improved understanding and respect for differing cultural identities.

An event to launch the project took place on Wednesday, February 19 at Waterside Shared Village from 7pm with the Deputy Mayor of Derry City and Strabane District Council, Darren Guy in attendance. The event included a LA Henna hand art, a collaborative drawing workshop from FUSE Arts, and food from Sandy's African Food Hub.

"We're delighted that the PEACEPLUS Local Action Plan for Derry City and Strabane District Council was able to fund the Out and About project," said Sue Divin, DCSD Council PEACE Manager.

"During our Co-design process, we listened closely to what individuals and representatives from our local Black and Minority Ethnic communities were saying about their priorities relevant to PEACEPLUS."

"There was huge interest in a project which, instead of raising awareness about BAME culture and identity in our more traditional communities, turned that on its head and allowed minority ethnic communities to understand local British, Irish and Northern Irish culture, history, politics and places. In a nutshell, that's what this project is all about."

In Your Space Circus is a circus school and street theatre company, which works with artists (local, national and international) with a wide range of skills. This is a drop-in event, no booking necessary, and it is completely free.

There will be arts and crafts station where artist facilitator Sinéad Crumlish will work with participants to weave a nature loom using natural materials such as reeds and branches and children of all ages are invited to come along and make styrofoam prints using natural materials.

Adults are invited to avail of a hot drink and snack provided by The Coffee Cart, grab a warm blanket provided, and take a seat with forager and folklorist Aoife de Bháil of Fálróid, who will be doing a talk and walk titled Wild food, folk customs and wonderful weeds, where participants are invited to

take part in a discussion on the traditions of harvesting wild food. Participants will learn about some of the common species which can be used for food or medicine and the folklore they have inspired over generations. You will never look at 'weeds' the same again!

Aoife de Bháil is a Gaeilgeoir, forager and folklorist from Béal Feirste. Aoife runs Fálróid, which

means 'to ramble' in Irish. Fálróid aims to connect people with the natural world and each other, through wild food, stories and the Irish language.

As part of the programme's theme of shared green spaces, we will also welcome Kidz Farm, who will bring an interactive farm experience to the Waterside. Bring the kids along to meet a selection of animals: rabbits, guinea pigs, ducks, chickens, a snake, bearded dragon, hedgehog, rats, tortoise, lamb and goat!

A spokesperson said: "We'll have some straw bales set up for parents to sit and keep an eye on the children as they get to know their new furry friends. We will also have a soft play area for your little tots so there will be something for everyone."

"In case of rain, we will have a marquee set up, as well as use of the Irish Street Community Centre, so we'll be there to welcome you, rain or shine!"
