Introduction and Guidance Notes

- 1.1 Section 75 of the Northern Ireland 1998 ("The Act") requires the Council in carrying out its functions, powers and duties to have due regard to the need to promote equality of opportunity:
 - between persons of different religious belief, political opinion, racial group, age, marital status or sexual orientation;
 - between men and women generally;
 - between persons with disability and persons without;
 - between persons with dependants and persons without.
- 1.2 In addition, without prejudice to its obligations above, the Council shall in carrying out its functions, powers and duties have regard to the desirability of promoting good relations between persons of different religious belief, political opinion or racial group. The Council supports the principles of good relations: equity, respecting diversity and interdependence, and the development of relationships built on trust and respect.
- 1.3 As stated in its Equality Scheme, the Council intends to screen all of its policies (formal and informal), functions and roles in order to determine which would require a fuller equality analysis in the form of an impact assessment.
- This questionnaire is aimed at providing a standardised, systematic approach to the policy scoping and screening exercise. A summary of this document will be made available to the Council's consultees and the general public, via the Council's web-site and in other formats, (upon request). This document may also be produced, in full, as part of consultations regarding Equality Impact Assessments.
- 1.5 When the Council is considering a new policy, it will determine whether the policy has the potential to have significant implications for equality of opportunity and/or good relations and if so will conduct a full impact assessment.

10(a). How does the policy contribute towards the achievement of the Council's strategic objectives?
The Corporate Strategy sets out four strategic themes which must underpin any plans for grant aid. The implications of these are considered in each of the points below: Leadership – Council has a lead responsibility for the community sector and needs to influence the policies and practice of other public sector organisations, and ideally other funders, to ensure that resources are utilised in the most effective manner. This is wholly compatible with the

÷

recommendations set out in the current Community Support Plan however, to be most effective in this task, Council must show that it is being strategic in how it utilises its own grant aid, effectively providing a model for others to support those things that are most in line with Council's future plans, clearly identified needs and wider regeneration priorities. Future Grant Aid must be strategic, lead by a shared understanding of local needs and priorities and should influence other funders. Funding and resources – Council recognises that resources are increasingly constrained while citizens' expectations are growing. This clearly requires excellent use to be made of limited grant aid and grants must address clearly identified needs and ensure cost effectiveness in terms of outcomes and usage. This places a requirement on Council to review the sustainability of its current funding arrangements, long term funding, Service Level Agreements and collaborative funding arrangements to ensure that all of these are working most effectively. Grant Aid must only fund projects and activities which are needed, cost effective and efficient and a culture of challenge and review should be integral to such funding.

Capacity building – community structures and provision have changed dramatically over the last few years and will continue to be increasingly professional and competitive. Council wishes to ensure that the groups and projects it funds are equipped with the necessary skills and expertise to deliver modern community based provision which is relevant to changing needs, of high quality and sustainable.

Service delivery – this focuses on performance management and customer satisfaction among other areas. Service delivery can only be truly effective in grant aid terms if it is based on sound understanding of local needs which in turn can only come from an appropriate process to facilitate local people identifying and prioritising need. This in turn can lead to sound customer satisfaction however the process needs to be proactively managed by Council. Local communities must be involved in determining local needs and excellent communication should ensure and understanding of how funding is utilised.

Organisational effectiveness – within this theme, the administration of grant aid must be undertaken in a way which is adequate to address accountability and probity yet at the same time must be efficient in use of staff and elected members' time. Grant aid mechanisms must use officers' and elected members' time wisely and sparingly.

10(b). What outcome do we want to achieve with this policy (and for whom)?

This policy seeks to develop a sound, effective and relevant grant aid programme, for Derry City Council. The beneficiaries of which will largely be groups from the community and voluntary sector in the Council area and beneficiaries of the funded projects.

Available evidence

Section 75 category	Details of evidence/information
Religious belief	Derry City Council policy states that Grant Aid cannot be used to further any particular religious belief, However, it noted in the Council's Audit of Inequalities 2012, one of the findings of Council's Household Survey 2011 was that 5% of respondents felt that Council's grant aid allocation benefitted one community more that the other and respondents felt that more community involvement in the process may help towards perceived equality.
Political opinion	The political make-up of Derry City Council is: SDLP 14, Sinn Fein 10; DUP 5; UUP 1. Derry City Council policy states that Grant Aid cannot be used to further any particular political opinion, although anecdotal evidence suggests that grant aid is accessed by people regardless of their political affiliation.
Racial group	Out of 63 applications to the Main Grant in the year 2013/14, 17 (27%) of which were awarded funding, only 2 (3%) came from groups that work on behalf of ethnic minority communities, and neither were successful. On the presumption that groups working on behalf of particular racial groups would be more likely to apply to the Good Relations fund, we have analysed the most recent tranche of Good Relations funding. Out of 66 applications to DCC Good Relations Grant Aid, a total of 7 (11%) were from groups that work on behalf of ethnic minority communities, 4 (4.5% were awarded funding).
Age	Groups / projects with beneficiaries from across the age spectrum have applied to DCC funding in recent years. For example in 2013/14, 15 applications (24%) were from organisations representing a particular age group (youth, 50+ etc) or groups intending to undertake projects with an age focus.

Sexual	The main grant programme only received one application from a group that sought to work with the LGBT community. The application was

orientation	unsuccessful.
Men and women generally	DCC's Grant Aid programme includes a Womens Development Programme. Out of 63 applications, 5 (8%) were to the Women's Development programme, 1 of which was funded. (1.6%) There is no specific fund for the promotion of Men's development. No applications to Main Grant were received from Men's groups.
Disability	Out of 63 applications to the Main Grant in the year 2013/14, 6 (10%) were from groups that work in the field of disability. 3 of those applications (5%) were awarded funding.
Dependants	Out of 63 applications to the Main Grant in the year 2013/14, 5 (8%) were from groups / projects that work with families with children. 4 of those applications (6%) were awarded funding.
