**DSPCSP 70/24      Manager's Report**

**PCSP Action Plan/Budget 2024-2025**

The PCSP Action Plan for 2024/2025 was forwarded to the Joint Committee (Department of Justice and NI Policing Board) for consideration on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> February 2024 following approval by members at the special PCSP meeting held on 6<sup>th</sup> February 2024.

In a communique issued on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2024, the Joint Committee advised that despite other competing pressures, they have decided to protect the overall PCSP budget for 2024/2025. This means that the amount allocated to Derry and Strabane PCSP for administration and operational will be the same as last year with no reduction. The Letter of Offer to Derry and Strabane PCSP for 2024/2025 has been received for £441,496.

The Joint Committee has monitored the spend profile over the last five years and have identified a high level of underspend in PCSP Members meetings expenses. This means that the meeting expenses budget for 2024/2025 will be £12,500.

In addition to this, the Department of Justice have confirmed that they will continue to provide funding of up to £3,600 towards administration for each support hub in

the 2024/2025 financial year.

The quarter 1 expenditure claim for the period 01.04.24 to 30.06.24 has been submitted to NIPB and DOJ. This claim has been approved and payment of £66,908.86 has been made to Derry City and Strabane District Council.

### **PCSP Induction Training**

NIPB have advised that they are planning and developing a comprehensive training programme for PCSP members. The first training session will take place on **Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> September 2024 from 6-8pm** in the Drummond Hotel, Ballykelly. PCSP members have already been advised of this date and quite a number of board members have confirmed availability to attend and NIPB have been advised accordingly. An alternative date for this same training is on **Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> October from 11.30am to 1.00pm** in Ranfurly House, Dungannon. Information on other training will be circulated as soon as it is confirmed.

### **Gifts/Hospitality of PCSP Members**

Section 11 of the PCSP Financial Guidelines provides guidance in relation to hospitality, competition prizes, gifts and incentives. In addition, the PCSP Member Handbook includes a section on Hospitality, Gifts and Entertainment which states the following:

“As a result of carrying out official duties, PCSP/DPCSP Members may on occasion be offered gifts/hospitality from third parties. Before accepting, PCSP/DPCSP Members should consider if it would be acceptable to the public for such a gift/hospitality to be received. Where a PCSP/DPCSP Member, having considered this issue accepts a gift/hospitality, it should be notified immediately to the PCSP Manager to be recorded in the Council Hospitality, Gifts and Entertainment Register. This disclosure requirement also relates to gifts/hospitality which are presented to a member’s immediate family and persons living in the same household. PCSP/DPCSP Members may only offer hospitality at the expense of the PCSP, with the prior approval of the Chair or in his/her absence the Vice-Chair and notification to the PCSP Manager following approval. A pre-condition for any such hospitality is that it will be in the direct interests of the PCSP and will assist the PCSP in fulfilling its statutory responsibilities.”

One of the recommendations emanating from the PCSP Audit for 2023/2024 states: “Internal Audit recommends that the PCSP Manager reissue the Handbook to Members as a reminder to members of their obligations with regards to this area.”

### **Small Project Support Recommendations 2024/2025**

The PCSP received a total of six (6) completed applications requesting support of £40,132.80.

The recommendation to award funding to the top five groups was approved at the PCSP meeting in May 2024.

All groups (both successful and unsuccessful) have been advised on the outcome of their application to the PCSP. Groups who have been awarded funding have been issued with a Letter of Offer and PCSP staff are working closely with groups to ensure that their project is delivered in line with expectations.

PCSP received notification from Men's Action Network who announced their suspension of services due to funding limitations and will no longer be able to fulfil the PCSP agreement of funding. As agreed in the PCSP meeting in May 2024 and in previous years, should underspends be identified throughout the year, then that under-spend will be re-allocated to the next group on the list up to their maximum eligible funding as per the table above. Therefore, allocation and revised Letters of Offer will be issued to the following groups.

Councillor Jackson asked members to support Men's Action Network who had to suspend their services due to lack of funding. Members agreed that this was a valuable service within the community.

### **Consensual Grant Aid 2024-2025**

For 2024/2025 the PCSP has allocated £141,600 funding to the 8 Local Growth Partnership Boards in the Council area under the consensual grant aid model.

All Local Growth Partnership Boards have been advised that the Action Plan submitted to PCSP has been approved and a Letter of Offer has been issued. Project delivery commenced over the summer months and the PCSP Chair and staff have been attending as many of these projects as possible

### Campaigns/Initiatives

**The Community Safety Wardens** continue to carry out patrols and have been engaging with a number of local initiatives to raise awareness of the service they provide and enhance the community safety of those living in the city and district. Between April and August 2024, the Community Safety Wardens have dealt with 673 referrals and provided 6,554 patrols of ASB hotspot areas. In addition to this, the Community Safety Wardens have attended 37 meetings and 30 events.

Alison Wallace raised the question regarding the Wardens coming to a future meeting and giving a presentation to this board on their work in the Community.

The Community Safety Wardens work across 2 teams:

•**City & Rural Team** cover Triax/Waterside/Outer North/Outer West as well as Strathfoyle, Eglinton, Claudy, Park, Maydown and Newbuildings. There are 8 Wardens who provide patrols. Hours of service are 12 noon to 5.00pm Monday to Wednesday and 5.30pm to 3.00am Thursday to Sunday. This team is based in the Council Depot at Skeoge. This team will also provide ad-hoc cover in the Derg, Sperrin and Strabane Town areas, however their capacity will be reduced.

•**Northland Team** cover the university precinct and city centre. There are 3 Wardens who provide patrols. Hours of service are 10.00pm to 5.00am Sunday to Thursday. This team is based in the NIFRS office, Northland Road.

All the Wardens are trained in mental health first aid, ASSIST and water safety training and further compliance training will be delivered over the next few months. The Community Safety Wardens continue to work closely with CCTV operators, PSNI officers and community organisations to ensure effective communication and partnership delivery.

**Rapid Bins** - PCSP has facilitated the installation of 23 *RAPID bins* (remove all Prescription and Illegal Drugs) across the city and district. The bins are located at:

Since their introduction in 2018, 79,765 tablets/pills have been deposited in and removed from the bins. The PCSP commissioned a short animation explaining how the bins operate and where they are currently located. This has been shared with those groups hosting the bins and has been posted on the PCSP facebook page: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UJMJ0Pz-Fp4>.

Any drugs removed from the bins are identified and logged by PSNI. Large

amounts of potentially harmful drugs are being deposited in the bins and then destroyed. This is really important given the high prevalence of prescription drugs named in suspected drug deaths in the Council area, especially tranquilisers and anti-anxiety drugs e.g. pregabalin, diazepam, naproxen, lyrica, tramadol, co-codamol etc.

**Manchester United Foundation's Street Reds Project** - PCSP is part of the steering group that is working in partnership with the **Manchester United Foundation's Street Reds Project**, NIHE, PSNI and the Youth Work Alliance to develop opportunities to engage young people in cross community activities through sport. This programme re-commenced in September 2024 at Caw and in St Joseph's Boys School, Creggan every Tuesday and Thursday evening. The Community Safety Wardens will continue to engage with young people at both locations.

**Home Security Equipment** - PCSP continues to provide and arrange fitting of home security equipment for victims of crime and elderly and vulnerable residents. From April to June 2024, 38 homes in the city and district were supplied and fitted with additional home safety equipment

A range of equipment is available including door chains, door peepholes, door wedge alarms, key safes, oil tank locks, padlocks, safe cans, security lights, door jammers and secure rings. Referrals for this scheme are taken from a range of partners including PSNI, community representatives, neighbourhood watch coordinators, community safety wardens, elected members and other statutory and voluntary agencies.

Members are encouraged to contact the PCSP office if they are aware of any residents within the council area who would benefit from these products. This equipment is fitted by Team-works.

The PCSP is working with colleagues in PSNI and domestic abuse agencies to continue the roll out a CCTV scheme to protect those highest risk domestic violence victims. This scheme provides added protection to victims and act as a deterrent to perpetrators. In addition to this, home and personal security and safety items are offered to victims of domestic abuse to help them feel safer at home and when they're out and about.

## **PCSP Project Coordinator**

### **Neighbourhood Watch**

There are currently 44 Neighbourhood Watch schemes within the council area, covering approximately 3,500 homes. The PCSP facilitates quarterly meetings with co-ordinators and PSNI and produce a quarterly Neighbourhood Watch Newsletter for co-ordinators to distribute within their respective schemes. These meetings give co-ordinators the opportunity to engage with PCSP and PSNI in relation to crime, policing and community safety issues in their neighbourhoods.

The PCSP now manages the schemes in partnership with PSNI and produces a newsletter for coordinators to distribute. Over 800 copies of the newsletter were distributed by coordinators in April 2024. The next series of meetings will take place in October 2024.

## CCTV

PCSP has been leading on the implementation of the recommendations contained in the Review of CCTV Infrastructure and Monitoring. The previously disparate CCTV systems have been integrated with the monitoring of all the cameras carried out on a 24/7 basis from a single location.

The CCTV system now comprises a total of 123 cameras, which are monitored 24/7 as part of the current contract. This also includes the integration and upgrade of the Ebrington public realm site, city centre, interface, Peace Bridge, Foyle Bridge, along the riverfront and Strabane town. Ninety-four (94) of these cameras are full function PTZ cameras that are capable of panning, tilting and zooming in for close-up images. The remaining twenty-nine (29) are IP fixed static cameras. All cameras have AI technology imbedded to enhance the performance of monitoring and early alert and search capabilities.

The CCTV initiative takes a multi-agency approach with partners from PSNI, City Centre Initiative, The Executive Office and Council. Council approved a Tender Report in January 2023 appointing a service provider to undertake the monitoring, remedial maintenance and replacement of the city and district's public surveillance CCTV system for a period of 5 years, with an option to extend for an additional 2 years.

Part of this new contract includes the upgrade of 75 existing cameras and the replacement of fibre boards during 2023-2024.

For quarter 1 of the current financial year (01.04.24 to 30.06.24) CCTV has dealt with 135 missing person reports, 62 attempted suicides and 179 suicide welfare concerns. It should be noted that the recent increase in suicide attempts is extremely concerning.

In relation to external funding towards the CCTV scheme for 2024/2025, a meeting was held in July 2024 with City Centre Initiative and current/potential funders to discuss the long-term funding of the CCTV scheme in the DCSDC area. At this meeting, attendees were provided with an overview of the current system including the number of incidents, types of incidents, requests and vulnerability issues, the cost effectiveness of the current system, comparisons with other CCTV schemes across NI, partnerships and communication streams and the current commitment of funders. This meeting was attended by representatives from CCI, DCSDC, PHA, PSNI, TEO and WHSCT. Since this meeting, PSNI have subsequently committed to provide £12,000 towards the CCTV scheme for 2024/25. Officers will continue to liaise with potential funders to secure additional funding towards the CCTV scheme.

Barry O'Hagan informed all members that emergency work was completed on the CCTV cameras on the Foyle Bridge. Unfortunately, there remains a gap in the funding for the system.

Councillor Jackson and Alison Wallace requested that additional funding be sought from other partners for CCTV Scheme.

Whilst there will be a shortfall over the next couple of years CI Yvonne McManus agreed that funding would be kept on their Agenda.



## Road Safety

The PCSP currently have three **Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs)** available for placement at locations across the city and district. These devices act as a warning to motorists who are driving above the speed limit.

Due to reduced resources in the PCSP for the next few months, the SIDs will not be operational until the New Year. SIDs are typically not operational from October to February each year due to reduced sunlight hours, which means that the solar panels don't have enough light to recharge.

Councillor Duffy asked through the Chair if there was cross border work, with communication, and to offer support to families. This was in relation to a local youth who was killed in an accident on the roads. She welcomed cross border cooperation and stated it was required in relation to road safety. She queried if there was there any way to improve closer working relationships.

CI Yvonne McManus responded that PSNI worked closely with the Garda in relation to cross border work and especially when there are large numbers.

Alderman Darren Guy raised the matter of a speed camera van parked dangerously on Crescent Link at the weekend, he felt that this was stopping drivers, of their line of sight, to the right-hand side. This was a danger to all drivers. Following a discussion CI Yvonne McManus agreed to invite Liam Dodds to explain the role of PSNI Road Safety Team.

## PSNI

Alison Wallace raised the question concerning the SIDS and why could they not be used during the winter with panels being charged during the day. Following a discussion, it was agreed that the PCSP Project Coordinator would check out the status of deploying the SIDS throughout the winter months with Property Services.

## PCSP Project Coordinator

PCSP Members were invited to submit requests for deployment by completing the SID request form and returning to the PCSP office; these will be added to the list for future deployments once the SIDs are operational again. All requests are held centrally and SIDs are rotated across these locations and remain on site for a period of 4 weeks to collect data. Data is then collated and shared with PSNI and DfI on request. This information can be used to target follow-up action by PSNI or can be used by DfI to identify areas where speed reduction measures would be beneficial.

On Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> May 2024 PCSP supported the *Bikesafe* workshop at St. Columb's Park House. This event was delivered by PSNI Roads Policing and gave motorcyclists the opportunity to take part in a classroom session followed by a ride out with advanced police riders.

The PCSP is supporting PSNI Roads Policing to deliver their cross-border **RoadSafe Roadshow** in Aura Leisure Centre, Letterkenny on **Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> October 2024 at 11.00am**. Schools from the Derry and Strabane District will attend this hard-hitting event that mixes theatre, video and first-hand accounts from police and emergency services to expose the dangers of driving. Family members of victims to road accidents also share their stories in a bid to educate young drivers to respect the roads.



The PCSP continues to work with partners in Life After, New Driver NI, NW Road Safety Partnership, Road Safe NI, and our emergency services to raise awareness of the consequences of risk-taking behaviour when driving.

PCSP will support **Life After and the NW Road Safety Partnership** to deliver the Road Safety Saturday event in Guildhall Square in November 2024 to highlight the start of Road Safety Week 2024 in partnership with PSNI, NIAS, NIFRS, NI Air Ambulance, Journeys NI, DFI and CCI.

The PCSP will continue to work in partnership with PSNI to deliver **Trailer Marking Events** throughout 2024/2025. The Trailer Marking event scheduled to take place on **Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> September** at Taylors of Fyfin was cancelled, however there will be a trailer marking event held on **Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> October** at St Josephs "Craigbane" GAC, Glenrandel Road/Crockmore Road from 9.00am to 3.00pm. This initiative is an excellent crime prevention measure to deter criminals and to assist police to establish the legitimate owners of vehicles that are recovered. It is anticipated that further dates will be secured throughout 2024/2025.

### **Policing Committee Meetings**

The last *PCSP Policing Committee* meeting was held on Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> July 2024 in The Council Chamber, DCSDC, Strabane. At this meeting the PSNI District Commander's Quarter 1 report was delivered from April to June 2024, detailing performance against the local and service policing plans and members had the opportunity to ask questions in relation to the report.

The next PCSP Policing Committee is scheduled for Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2024 when the District Commander will deliver the Quarter 2 Performance Report for 2024/2025.

### **Public Meetings**

Earlier this year PCSP members agreed that we should explore the possibility of holding a public meeting of the PCSP in the Autumn. Members also agreed that this should be a themed meeting. A date and theme for this meeting has not yet been agreed and members are asked to keep this under consideration. Public meetings provide a great opportunity to promote the work of the PCSP further and to explore in-depth some of the community safety issues affecting our communities.

### **Justice and Security Stop & Search Powers**

PCSP Members are invited to attend monthly accountability meetings with PSNI to scrutinise their use of Justice and Security Stop & Search Powers. At these meetings, the PCSP member will have the opportunity to randomly select a number of body worn videos to watch and see how searches have been carried out. Members will have the opportunity to ask questions and discuss the search(es) with PSNI. The purpose of these meetings is to ensure transparency and accountability.

The next tranche of these meetings from September to November 2024 have been circulated and places have all been filled. The PCSP office will liaise with PSNI to secure more dates for these meetings from January 2025 and members will be advised of the dates as soon as these are available.

## **The Support Hub**

The *Support Hub* continues to meet monthly, with the last meeting held on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2024. Since its establishment in August 2016, the Support Hub has dealt with 335 referrals.

The Support Hub was established to share information and deliver tailored support to those most vulnerable in our communities. The Hub is chaired by the PCSP Manager with PSNI, NIFRS, NIHE, YJA, PBNI, NIAS, EANI, A&E, Adult Safeguarding, Children Safeguarding and Mental Health services all attending. Those considered most vulnerable including young people susceptible to paramilitary attack/influence, young people susceptible to organised crime gang influence, repeat victims of ASB, repeat victims of hate crime, older people subject to repeat incidents and repeat victims in general.

The Support Hub is currently undergoing an evaluation to measure the effectiveness of the hub. As part of this evaluation, each Support Hub has provided data on the number of referrals on the hub as well as a synopsis of the main challenges faced by referrals. In addition to this, each Support Hub has submitted a few case studies telling the story of these referrals to the hub. This included an outline of what issues these individuals are dealing with, the impact/benefits on their life or their wider family's, how they interacted with the agencies that sit on the Support Hub and the impact on agencies providing support. Once this evaluation is complete, this information will be shared with PCSP members.

## **Inspection of Community Safety and Local Policing Arrangements for NI**

The Criminal Justice Inspection Northern Ireland (CJI) undertook an inspection of Community Safety and Local Policing Arrangements in NI during 2023. The inspection will focus on the three main elements of the CJI inspection framework and assessed the progress made against recommendations made in CJI's 2019 review of PCSPs.

Inspectors made 9 recommendations for improvement (1 strategic and 8 operational) and all of these recommendations were directed to either DOJ or PSNI for implementation.

## **Community Safety Forums/Interagency Meetings**

Community Safety Wardens regularly attend the Community Safety Forums in Triax, Outer West, Outer North, Waterside, Top of the Hill and Strathfoyle/Maydown. These forums are community led and are also attended by PSNI Neighbourhood Police Teams, NIHE and other relevant organisations.

PCSP officers also participate in Strabane Rural and Urban Interagency meetings, which are led by Supporting Communities NI and attended by a range of statutory agencies such as DCSDC, DRD, NIHE, PSNI and community representatives. The Strabane Town Community Safety Forum is also attended by Community Safety Wardens.

**DSPCSP 71/24      Any Other Business**

Alderman Niree McMorris raised that during the summer months between Irish Street and Top of the Hill, youths were gathering for organised fights, she requested if the PSNI aware of this? Councilor Christopher Jackson informed the meeting that youth workers at Top of the Hill have carried out a lot of work during the summer months.

Alison Wallace referred to the End Violence Against Women & Girls (EVAGW) strategy and asked if there could possibly be a presentation to the PCSP board in the future and if there was a way that the Local Community Growth Partnership Boards could support the implementation of the strategy within Communities if funding was available.
