



It is also a café.

Description of Activity	the Skeoge area of Ballynarett DEA. The area is a new, fast developing social housing neighbourhood with approximately 7000 residents by 2025. It is predominantly CNR/Single-identity, the community has a wide range of complex and inter-connected problems (and opportunities), which have led to low levels of civic and civil participation. There are increasing resident concerns in relation to the lack of any community development infrastructure and amenities – neighbourhood centre / youth facilities. The project helps address these concerns.
	The programme has 2 elements: 1. Capital: purchase a minibus and 3 pop up marquees. Marquees are essential to provide venue options for shared space programming. 
